The 2015 Breeding Bird Survey: How it Was Done and What it Found

At 13,000 acres (20 square miles!), the Patuxent Research Refuge contains a variety of habitats ranging from bottomlands along the Patuxent River to upland pine forests, swamps and upland hardwoods on lands that formerly were part of Fort George G. Meade. The Fort Meade lands, now called the North Tract, also contain various firing ranges still used by military and law enforcement agencies. Hunting also takes place there.

The refuge has a long history of bird studies facilitated by a system of grid markers installed over most of the refuge in the 1940s that forms a convenient framework for long-term studies; the same grid markers can be repeatedly sampled. Of course, these studies also benefit from having some of the best birders around on the staff at Patuxent who are willing to donate some mornings to counting birds!

In 2008, Dr. John Sauer organized a bird survey around the grid system, visiting grid markers 400 meters apart and conducting bird counts during breeding season. These counts were used to map bird distributions on the refuge, and to develop statistical models to evaluate the effects of management activities on bird populations. Last year (2015), the survey was repeated to analyze changes in bird populations over the 7 years.

This talk will focus on the joys and tribulations of organizing and conducting a bird survey. It rained almost constantly, and the roads on the refuge were often partially flooded. Many points were located beyond wading depth, causing a lot of frustration, but persistence and a high tolerance for wet feet led to a surprisingly complete survey. Parts of the refuge are generally closed to public access due to the active ranges; getting into these areas was a rare treat, although one that required a great deal of careful planning to minimize the possibility of the observers becoming targets themselves. Results of the study with maps of species distributions, and documentation of habitat associations with species, will be given.

Dr. John Sauer is a wildlife biologist and Senior Scientist at the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center, specializing in the analysis of changes in bird populations and author of hundreds of scientific papers. He is also an excellent birder.

President's Perch

Migrations

While the dogwood blossoms linger, bright green shoots sprout, and leaves unfurl on trees and shrubs, birds are on the move. Some pass through to breeding grounds to the north, while others drop by for a respite, and still others are busy courting, building nests, and laying eggs. On April 18, the *Smithsonian's Nestwatch* study reported nests already for Northern cardinal, Carolina wrens, American robin and Tufted titmouse, and to be on the lookout for Chickadee nests as well for their food web study. I was excited seeing my first Catbirds of the year a week later, followed by an ever-singing House Wren who has been checking out my Chickadee nest box since. That box was the successful site of many years of Carolina Chickadee nests and 7 Carolina chickadee fledglings two summers ago. That wasn't to be last summer and evidently not this either, though an unbanded Chickadee pair hung around our yard feeding and explored the box a few times. I like to believe that one was one of "my" unbanded fledglings, comfortable in the neighborhood and visiting the same trees. It will be interesting to see if someone else takes up residency in any of the four nest boxes around the house. What a great time of year!

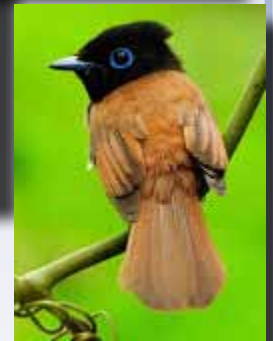

PGAS and our entire community greatly benefited from the talents, dedication, hard work, enthusiasm, and friendliness of each of these board members.

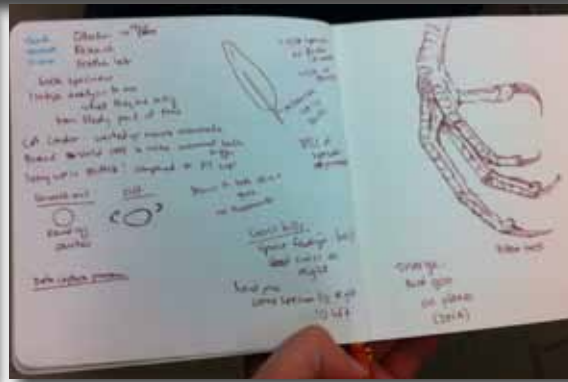
We wish them well and hope to see them around!
